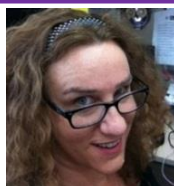


Welcome to PPSS March Newsletter

Sharing information

What is Journal Club?

The PPSS Journal Club began in 2009. It is an informal, monthly gathering where people meet to share their experiences of caring for and raising children in permanent care, kinship care, adoption and foster care. There is always support and often laughter about the challenges and joys of parenting.

Every family's individual journey is deeply respected in this non-judgemental setting.

Prior to each monthly Journal Club gathering, a short publication or research article is circulated for use as a discussion starter. However, it is not necessary to have read the article beforehand.

Topics vary and tend to emerge from participants' experience. Topics can range from school-related issues to more complex issues such as how to talk to children about their difficult backgrounds, how to manage challenging behaviours, and how to move to a place of healing - plus much more ...

Journal Club gatherings can be seen as a real opportunity for shared learning. Participants share valuable insights into different ways of supporting troubled children and also benefit from mutual support provided by others in the group. Professional workers are also welcome to attend and contribute to the discussion. Workers also benefit from hearing about the lived experiences of carers and parents.

Journal Club meets on the first Thursday of each month 8pm – 9.30pm at the Collingwood Library, Stanton Street Abbotsford - no registration necessary. Participants pay a gold coin to cover the room rental.



A new Journal Club will be starting in May in Werribee. Dates for this new Journal Club will be available to members soon.

Journal Club... so much more than a discussion group

As PPSS evaluators we recently conducted a detailed examination of Journal Club and its contribution: we attended meetings, interviewed people who regularly attend, talked in depth to the facilitators and gathered information from an online survey.

Between two and 20 people have attended each Journal Club session. Regular participants say it gives them significant emotional support, and they also value learning about a variety of topics. Some can't attend every session but are enthusiastic occasional participants. What seems to happen for everyone is that their experiences are 'normalised', and it is a relief not to have to explain their situation. Centring discussions around articles is important, but so is sharing each other's lives and experiences for a short time every month.

What really surprised us was the large number of PPSS members who read the articles but don't attend meetings – over two-thirds of the 46 survey respondents. Some said they would like to discuss the articles in a group setting but can't attend Journal Club at the current evening timeslot and location in Collingwood. Some people volunteered to help establish a Journal Club in their own area. While others just wanted to read the articles for information, a number were interested in an on-line discussion group.

This work is part of an ongoing evaluation, and we will continue to report our findings as they come in.

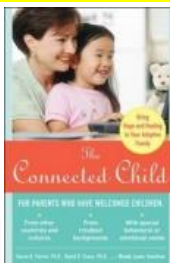

The Connected Child
Bring Hope and Healing to
your Adoptive Family

For parents who have welcomed children from other countries and cultures; from troubled backgrounds; with special behavioural or emotional needs

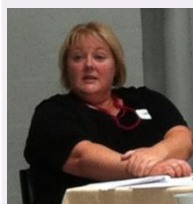
The Connected Child is a very easy to read book that offers hope to parents in their efforts to build stronger bonds with their adopted child, and to effectively deal with any learning or behavioural disorders. It offers a compassionate approach to helping your child heal, which has been developed by psychologists especially for children who have experienced early deprivation, trauma and attachment issues.

There are lots of practical, common sense strategies for parenting which focus on keeping the loving connection with your child, and helping your child learn appropriate behaviours and social skills.

The book offers simple but helpful explanations on topics such as: healthy and unhealthy child development; difficult behaviour; dealing with defiance; supporting healthy brain chemistry; and also gives lots of proactive strategies to make life easier.

Workshop: *Understanding Lying and Stealing Behaviour in Traumatized Children*



On 23 March PPSS hosted a workshop on *Understanding Lying and Stealing Behaviour in Traumatized Children*. Led by Catherine McQueen, our presenter and also a senior clinician at Berry Street's Take Two service, we explored the impact of trauma on

children's development and relational capacity. Discussion centred on the impetus for lying and stealing by trauma-affected children, and the role of adults in supporting children to change their behaviour without driving them towards shame.

Useful resources for parents in this area include books by Daniel Hughes and Bruce Perry, including *Attachment-Focused Parenting* which is available via the PPSS book store.

Who am I? Making Records Meaningful - A new resource to support children's identity

Children develop a sense of who they are through the stories they are told about their childhoods and their families – through birth as well as through adoption or permanent care.

The records created about children while they are in care can be a key source of information, especially when children are not in touch with their family's oral historians.

As adults, these children will have access to the information in these records to help them come to terms with childhood experiences and develop a positive sense of identity.

Researchers from the *Who am I?* project have developed Who am I? Making Records Meaningful, a set of online resources to guide record-keeping that supports this sense of identity. Themes include:

- The 'Life Story Archive' and what it could contain
- What care leavers want to see in their records
- The story WITHIN the record
- Locating and accessing records
- The story OF the record
- Tip sheets for carers, workers and organisations
- Links to further resources

Free Service for International Kinship Carers

Anyone who is caring for a relative child from overseas will know the joys, challenges and struggle such a situation involves. It is not always easy to find support, but a new service of International Social Service (ISS Australia) may be able to assist.

ISS Australia has been providing social work and specific legal services to families and children requiring assistance across international borders for over 50 years. In 2012 ISS received funding from the Barr Foundation to deliver counselling, support and outreach services to Victorian kinship carers and children who have arrived from overseas. This includes children for whom kinship care has been ordered by an overseas child protection authority, or unaccompanied children who have been directly sponsored by family members as orphan relatives.

The service is free and is delivered by qualified social workers. Service staff can offer short-term information and referral, or longer-term support, counselling and outreach. Anyone is welcome to contact ISS Australia to make enquiries about how our service can assist.
