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Post Placement Support Service (PPSS) is a not-forprofit community organisation that assists kinship carers, permanent carers and adoptive parents to access peer support and specialist services. We believe well supported families can build and maintain stable and positive family lives for children and young people. Our services are designed to strengthen relationships and nurture understanding through education and support.

The services available from the Post Placement Resource Centre are provided by a team of experienced and caring professionals, supported by dedicated volunteers.

Education for carers and parents – specialist training programs and information sessions covering a wide range of topics, such as managing attachment difficulties; dealing with challenging behaviours; contact with birth families; adolescent identity issues and therapeutic parenting techniques.

Education for professionals – professional development and consultancy for child welfare practitioners, allied health professionals and teachers to increase understanding of issues relevant to children and families in permanent care, kinship care, foster care and adoption.

Carer information and support service – operating in conjunction with the Foster Care Association of Victoria to provide individual support and information through telephone help line, web sites, newsletters and fact sheets as well as professional referrals for specialist support and assistance.

**Support groups** – regional self-help support groups offering play activities for children and social interaction for carers and adoptive parents in a safe and nurturing environment.

Online resource centre – includes publications and online learning opportunities, as well as links to local, national and international care and adoption networks.

**Resource library** – a lending library of donated books and reference materials relating to permanent care, kinship care, foster care and adoption.



Mirror Families Program – Mirror Families is a new approach which focuses on creating enduring support networks for vulnerable children and young people. The Mirror Families Consultancy Service offers information, training and support to community service agencies for program development and work with individual families.

Kinship and permanent care engagement – provided in partnership with child placement agencies to enhance support and education for carers with a particular focus on reaching out to isolated grandparent and relative carers who have limited personal or professional support.

Research and best practice – conducted in partnership with researchers, academic institutions and other community service organisations to inform and develop best practice models of post placement specialist support for children and families.

**Advocacy** – to influence government policy, increase public awareness about service gaps and achieve better outcomes for children and young people in the home based care and adoption systems.
