

EDUCATION – WHAT ARE YOU ENTITLED TO?

The cost of education is high no matter what form of education you are hoping to offer a child in your care. For many carers, DHS or your community services agency may well be able to assist with covering the costs associated with putting children through school. For other carers, particularly those in non-statutory kinship arrangements, this assistance is not always forthcoming. The following subsidies and fee assistance packages are available to all statutory and non-statutory carers:

<p>Education Maintenance Allowance</p> <p>\$230 pa for primary school students</p> <p>\$460 pa for secondary school students (paid on a pro rata basis the year a child turns 16 at which time payment ceases)</p> <p>Source: DEECD Website</p>	<p>The applicant must – on the first day of Term 1 for the first instalment, and on the first day of Term 3 for the second instalment:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) be an eligible recipient of a Centrelink pension, allowance or benefit and be a holder of either a Health Care Card or a Pensioner Concession Card b) Or be a Veterans Affairs (TPI) pensioner c) Or be a foster parent and d) Submit the application to the school by the submission dates 	<p>Payments are received in 2 instalments per year. <p>School Start Bonus</p> <p>Introduced in 2006 to assist parents/guardians with the start up costs of sending children to school.</p> <p><u>Amount:</u> \$300 per eligible child</p> <p>Source: DEECD Website</p>	<p>Each student enrolled in Prep and Year 7 and in attendance in Term 1 at any registered Victorian schooled (govt or non-govt). Children who are being home school and are registered with the Vic Registration and Qualifications Authority will also be eligible.</p>	<p>If voucher not received by the end of Nov 2008 contact your school.</p>	<p>Schools will issue payment vouchers to all parents/guardians before the end of this school year (2008).</p> <p>These vouchers will be redeemable through any Australia Post Office 10th January 2011 to assist parents/guardians in the purchase of books, uniforms, etc.</p>	<p>Contact your school to clarify when the voucher will be provided to you. <p>Independence (Youth Allowance)</p> <p>A higher rate of Youth Allowance may be payable if the young person is considered to be independent.</p> <p>Source: Centrelink Website</p>	<p>Young people may be considered independent if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ they are over 23 and a full time student of Australian Apprentice ➤ they meet the criteria for having supported themselves in paid employment; ➤ they have been married or have been living in a marriage-like relationship for 12 months or more, or ➤ they have or have had a dependent child, or ➤ it is unreasonable for them to live at home – for example due to an extreme family breakdown; ➤ they are a refugee, an orphan or are (or have been) in State care. <p>Parent Payments in Victorian Government Schools</p> <p>There are three categories of education items or services for which schools can request payment from parents or guardians:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ essential education items for which the parent/guardian must pay to provide, or for which the parent/guardian must pay the school to provide (eg: text books, stationary, school uniforms where required) ➤ optional educational items which are offered on a user-pays basis allowing the parent /guardian to choose whether their child has access to such items; (eg: school magazines or extra curricular activities) ➤ voluntary financial contributions which parents and guardians may be invited to donate to the school; <p>School Councils are required to develop their own policy around these payments, with the stipulation being that the developed policy be in line with the Department's policy, and it be made available to all parents and guardian upon request.</p> <p>For further information to go http://www.education.vic.gov.au/management/schooloperations/schoolcharges.htm or http://www.eduweb.vic.gov.au/edulibrary/public/schacc/parentpayments-pol-oct2007.pdf</p> <p>Source: DEECD Website</p>				
<p>State Schools' Relief Committee</p> <p>The State Schools' Relief Committee Incorporated is an autonomous body that assists needy students attending government schools in Victoria with school clothing and footwear.</p> <p>All requests for assistance must be lodged with the School Principal, and the Principal must then lodge an application for assistance on behalf of the parent or guardian with the State Schools' Relief Committee.</p> <p>Note: Most schools will offer a second hand uniform shop which provides parents/guardian with a cheaper uniform option for their child.</p> <p>Source: DEECD Website</p>				
<p>Kindergarten / Pre-School</p>	<p>For children with a Health Care Card, the fees for children to attend Kindergarten are minimal to non-existent. In many cases, the initial deposit paid when registering your child for kindergarten will cover the fees for the year as the kindergarten can claim the costs back against the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development.</p>	<p>Your kindergarten or local council will be able to provide you with the dates relevant to your chosen kindergarten.</p>	<p>Generally children attend Kindergarten or Pre-School in the year preceding the year they start Primary School.</p> <p>This will vary from child to child, as will the requirement or benefit of a child attending a second year of kindergarten or pre-school prior to commencing Primary School.</p>	<p>For further information contact your local council or kindergarten.</p> <p>Many areas now have a centralised enrolment process for children entering kindergarten.</p>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You can ONLY access free kindergarten or kindergarten at minimal costs if you have a Health Care Card, Pensioner Concession Card, Veteran's Affairs Gold Card, Asylum Seeker Bridging Visa A-F or Temporary Protection Visa (447, 451, 785 and 786) <p>A child is only legible for this repayment if they are 4 years of age before the 30th of April of that year.</p> <p>This service is not available for 3 year old kindergarten as it is only provided to those who are entering primary school the following year.</p>		<p>The Victoria Government funds approx. 10 hours of kindergarten fee subsidy to provide for 10 hours of a kindergarten program per week for free (or up to the value of \$205 per week.) This payment goes directly to the kindergarten program.</p> <p>This is only valid for government funded kindergartens with qualified early childhood teachers. <p>Education Tax Refund</p> <p>The refund will be provided at the following levels:</p> <p>A maximum refund of \$390 per primary school child;</p> <p>A maximum refund of \$779 per secondary school child;</p> <p>Source: Jenny Macklin MP Website</p>	<p>The rebate will be available to all parents that are related to Family Tax Benefit Part A, or whose school children receive Youth Allowance or a similar payment.</p>	<p>The tax refund will be payable at the end of the 2010/2011 financial year.</p>	<p>Parents/guardians need to collect the receipts for items they purchase as part of their child's education such as, laptops, computers text books and stationary. <p>Education Expense Payment</p> <p>Payments will be \$300 for a full year for children at primary school</p> <p>\$450 for a full year for children at secondary school.</p>	<p>To be eligible for the 2011 school year, educational assistance will be linked to case planning for children in Victorian foster and kinship care placements and where there is active child protection involvement. For kinship carers without current active child protection involvement and where there is no permanent care order in place, administration of this assistance will be linked to the carer reimbursement process.</p>	<p>Payments made as a lump sum directly into your bank account</p>	<p>Parents/guardians need to contact case planner and make sure this payment is included in the child's case planning</p>	<p>For queries about the payments, call the caregiver help desk on 1300 552 319 or refer to your caseworker.</p>
